Chagas disease is a potentially fatal neglected disease that affects between 8 and 10 million people worldwide. Chagas kills more people in Latin America than any other parasite-borne disease, including malaria. Existing treatments for Chagas disease are not satisfactory and can have toxic side effects.

DNDI | Best science for the most neglected
Chagas disease is named after the Brazilian physician Carlos Chagas, who discovered the disease in 1909. It is caused by the parasite Trypanosoma cruzi, which is transmitted to animals and people by insect vectors and is found only in the Americas (mainly, in rural areas of Latin America where poverty is widespread).

The Drugs for Neglected Diseases Initiative (DNDI) is a collaborative, patients' needs-driven, non-profit drug research and development (R&D) organization that is developing new treatments for neglected diseases, notably leishmaniasis, sleeping sickness (human African trypanosomiasis, HAT), Chagas disease, malaria, filarial diseases, mycetoma, paediatric HIV, and hepatitis C. DNDI's malaria activities were transferred to Medicines for Malaria Venture (MMV) in 2015.

Chagas is known as a "silent disease," and most people only experience a fever – if that – when they are first infected. The disease will then remain asymptomatic for years after infection, meaning most people are unaware of their condition. For 30-40% of people infected, the disease progresses to a late chronic stage.

Chagas disease is caused by an infection with a blood parasite called Trypanosoma cruzi. Chagas disease is incurable. Those who have Chagas disease are usually symptom-free.
